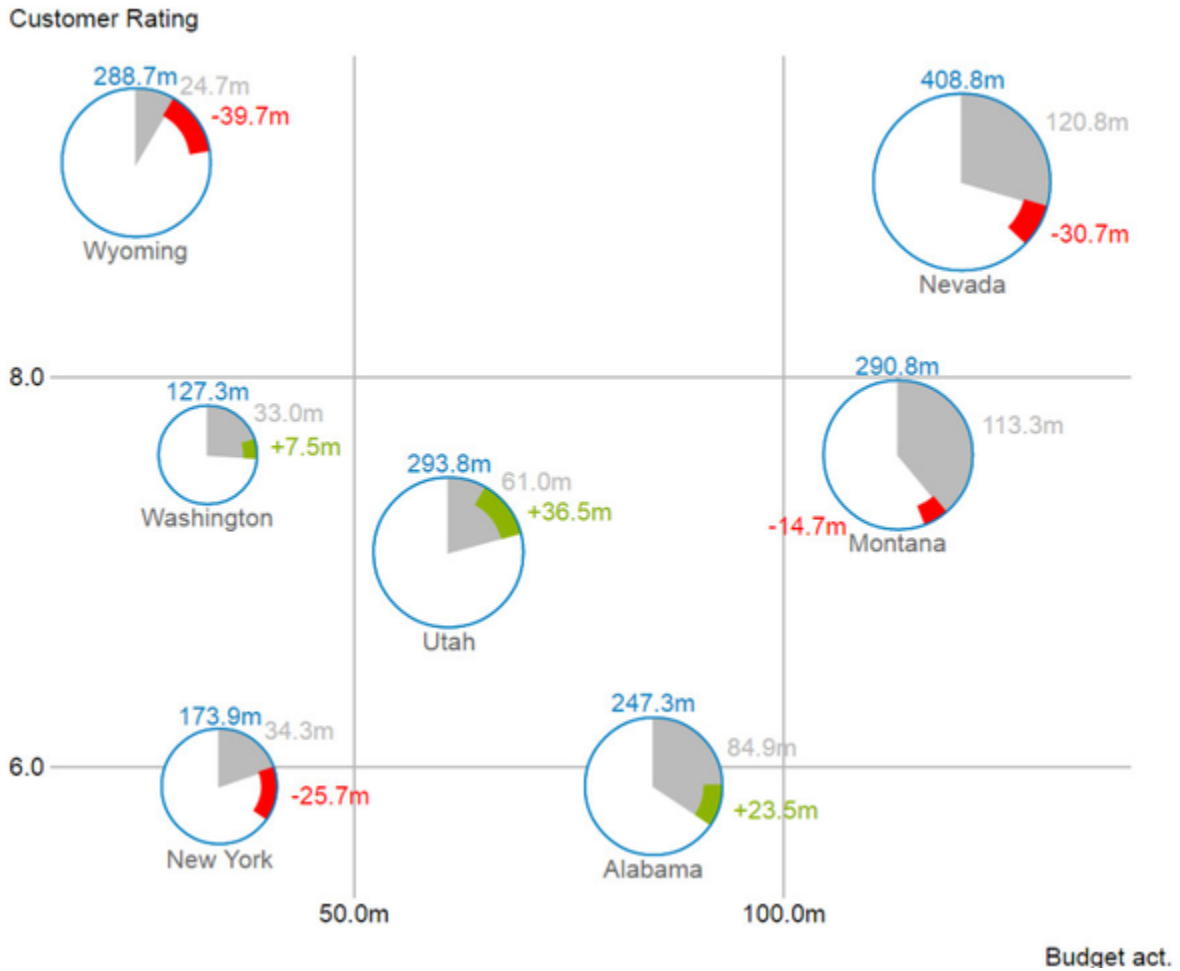


User Manual for the graphomate bubbles for SAP Lumira Designer

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Introduction

Visualizations are gaining more and more importance in regards to quick and safe communication. Information presented in a simple, yet meaningful way supports deciders to find patterns and deviations. Good information design can give you a quick and efficient overview of your business. The International Business Communication Standards (IBCS) are working as a ruleset of how meaningful visualizations are used most effectively for business reporting and dash boarding.

In addition to our *graphomate charts* and the *graphomate tables* we offer the *graphomate bubbles* as another component for SAP Designer (furthermore „Designer“), which aligns itself with the IBCS concepts. Designer is the successor of the Web Application Designer (WAD) from the SAP BEx-Suite and tightly coupled with SAP BW. It uses HTML5 web technologies to produce BI Applications in the browser and as such does not restrict you to certain end devices, including mobile devices.

With our Designer extension *graphomate bubbles* we present a highly configurable visualization solution for this platform. The *graphomate bubbles* extension is suitable to map a portfolio of values for a small number of objects on two value axes. Up to 5 KPIs can be visualized for approximately two dozen bubbles. A two-dimensional utilization as scatterplot is possible. In addition it can be used as a „*bubble chart*“ to find patterns and correlations in up to 5 dimensions of highly aggregated data. Of course the *graphomate bubbles* also offer many additional features you might be familiar with from our other components. This includes a collision logic for overlapping labels, a number format configuration and optical customization.

i In the sense of a uniform language regulation we speak in the further manual of Lumira Designer or briefly Designer.

For the *graphomate bubbles* extension we recommend the use of Designer 2.0 >= SP03 with the Internet Explorer 11+ or any comparable modern browser. For further information – e.g. regarding the deployment on the Business Intelligence Platform (BIP) or SAP Netweaver – please consult the Product Availability Matrix ([PAM](#)).

Installation

- ✘ • Before opening your old dashboards/BI apps with Designer 2.0, you need to migrate them to m mode with Design Studio 1.6.
- Our extensions for Design Studio 1.6 will also run in Designer 2.0. When starting Lumira Designer 2.0, please do not import our graphomate extension from SAP Design Studio 1.6. Instead we suggest using the versions specifically built for Designer 2.0.

Local installation of the extension to Designer

You have installed Designer 2.0 SP03+ on your computer.

1. Save the zipfile *graphomate_bubbles_2021.x.x_LumiraDesigner.zip* to a folder of your choice.
2. In Designer, choose *Tools Install Extension to Lumira Designer*, click on *Archive* and select the zipfile which has been saved before.
3. Choose *Finish* to start the installation.
4. Choose *Next* and again *Next* to confirm the installation.
5. Accept the terms of the license agreement and choose *Finish*.
6. Choose *Yes* to allow a restart of Designer.
7. After the restart, the graphomate extension appears in the Component View of Designer.

Removing the extension from Designer

In Designer choose *Help > About...*

1. Click the *Installation Details* button.
2. Select the component *graphomate bubbles 2021.x.x*
3. Choose *Uninstall...*
4. In the *UninstallWizard* choose *Finish*.
5. Choose *Yes* to allow Designer to restart.

Server installation of the extension

Users need to deploy the locally installed extension to the BI platform before launching the *graphomate bubbles* from the BI platform.



1. Choose in the BI Platform Mode *Tools > Platform Extensions*.
2. Select the extension *graphomate bubbles* that is installed on your local computer.
3. Choose *Install on Platform*.
4. Manually restart the BI Platform Adaptive Processing Servers that host the Analysis Application Service and accept the warnings in Designer.
5. The *graphomate* extension appears under *Extensions Installed on Platform*.
6. Choose *Close*.
7. Again restart the BI Platform Adaptive Processing Servers that host the Analysis Application manually.

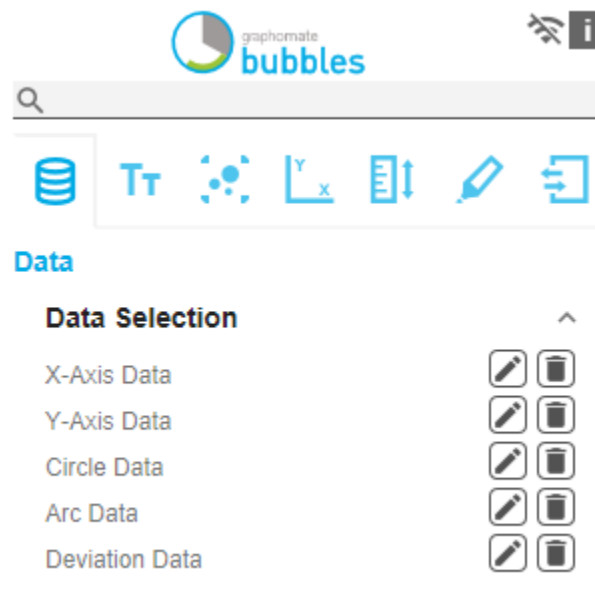
Uninstalling the extension from the Server

1. Choose in the BI Platform Mode *Tools > Platform Extensions*.
2. Choose the *graphomate bubbles*.
3. Choose *Uninstall from Platform*.
4. Confirm the uninstalling by choosing *Yes*.
5. In order to complete the uninstalling process, manually restart the BI Platform Adaptive Processing Servers that host the Analysis Application Service and accept the warnings in Designer.
6. The *graphomate bubbles* is then removed from the *Extensions Installed on Platform*.
7. Choose *Close*.
8. Manually restart the BI Platform Adaptive Processing Servers that host the Analysis Application Service.

Quick Start

You have set up a *Data Source* and now want to visualize a data series of this query with the *graphomate bubbles*.

1. Drag a *graphomate bubbles* component onto the canvas and attach a *Data Source* by dragging it on top of this component.
2. Set the series on the Data tab in the *graphomate property sheet* by clicking on the corresponding  Button . You will be able to choose a row or column from your *Data Source* in the *Initial View*. Confirm the highlighted data by clicking  .
3. The series labels will be taken automatically from the metadata of the selected dimension members.



Overview

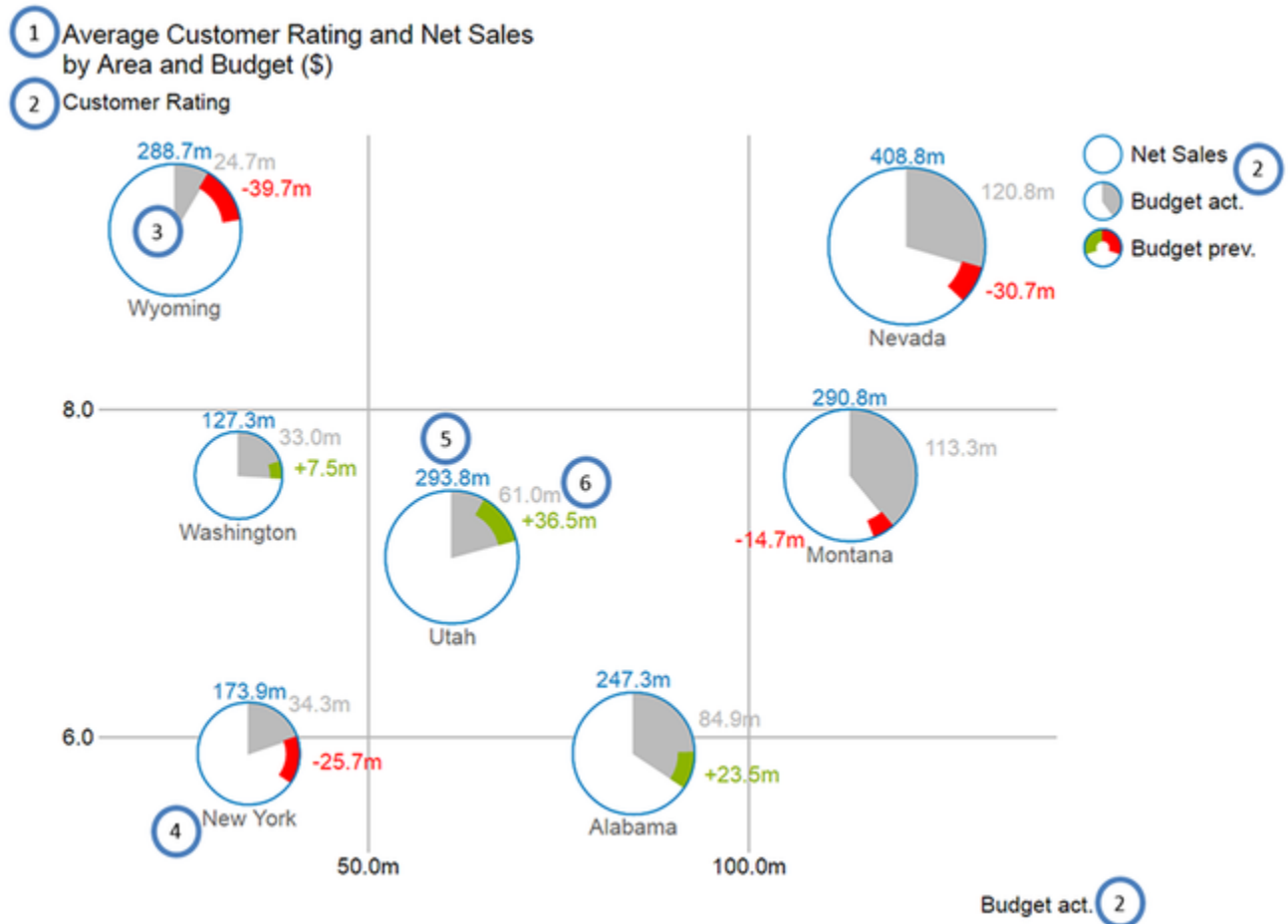
Data Dimensions of the graphomate bubbles

With the *graphomate bubbles* you will be able to visualize up to five data dimensions. These data series are the following.

Dimension	Description
<i>X Axis</i>	A series of values which will represent the coordinates on the x axis of the data points. The x axis represents the main dimension and serves as source for the extraction of diagram labels.
<i>Y Axis</i>	A series of values which will represent the coordinates on the y axis of the data points. The y axis represents the subordinate dimension which contains a matching value for each element of the x axis.
<i>Circle</i>	A series of values representing the area of the <i>Bubbles</i> . Setting data of this series is <u>optional</u> , but it requires the previously described series to be set. If no data is set here the chart will be drawn as a <i>Scatterplot</i> .
<i>Arc</i>	A series of values representing the area of the grey segment of each bubble (see picture below). This optional segment show the share of the corresponding value of the <i>Circle</i> series. Hence it is obligatory that the <i>Circle</i> series is set, if you want to use the <i>Arc</i> series.
<i>Deviation</i>	A series of values, also optional, which represents yet another segment of the whole circle. This segment is intended for a previous year value. This value's deviation from the <i>Arc</i> value is displayed by a red or green bar (see picture below) for a positive or negative deviation respectively. This series can only be used if the previously described series are set.

i Please take care that you do not select data series with different offsets. For example, do not select the members January to June for the x axis and July to December for the y axis. You should select values of the same members for the y axis to ensure the values to match each other and the diagram labels to be extracted correctly.

Visual objects of the graphomate bubbles





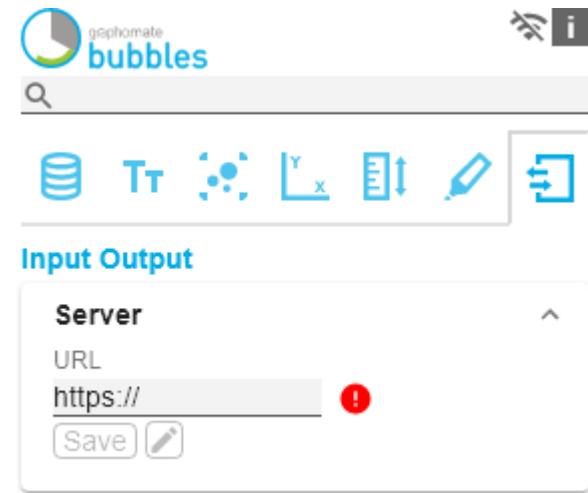



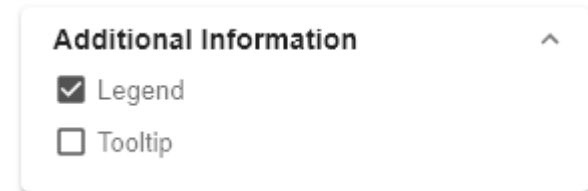


1. *Title* for the diagram (may contain more than one row).
2. *Series Labels*, one for each data series. They are automatically generated from the data selection. The *Series Labels* of the data series *X Axis* und *Y Axis* (see above, *Budget act.* And *Customer Rating*) are displayed on the respective axis. They are called *Axis Labels*. The *Series Labels* for the data series *Circle*, *Arc* and *Deviation* (see above, *Net Sales*, *Budget act.* and *Budget prev.*) are displayed as a legend on the right.
3. *Bubbles*: The elements of this diagram are called *Bubbles* and represent a set of information according to the selected data series.
4. The *Category Label* is the label for a *Bubble*, which is generated from the data selection of the x axis series.
5. The *Circle Label* of a *Bubble* specify the value of its *Circle Dimension*, which is the data series that defines this *Bubbles'* area.
6. The *Value Labels* of a *Bubble* specify the values of *Arc* dimension (see above, grey area) and the deviation from the dimension *Deviation* (see above, red and green bars).

Filter Option

In some cases, it is necessary that several settings are only applied to certain key figures, dimensions or dimensional characteristics. You can use the filter option to define the combination to which the setting is to be applied.

In the example on the left, the desired setting is only applied to the key figure "budget". This can be, for example, a certain number formatting, a scenario or a certain icon for displaying the key figure.

Filter states can be defined in the following settings of graphomate extensions:

- graphomate matrix
 - Value Format
 - Calculations/Deviations
 - Scenario Assignment
 - Bar Chart Assignment
 - Pin Chart Assignment
 - Background Bar Assignment
- graphomate bubbles
 - Value Format
- graphomate pictograms
 - Pictograms/Icon Assignment

Input mode: Field / comma separated list (csv)

Properties with the  symbol allow the definition of settings on the graphomate property sheet in two

variants. The mode can be changed by clicking on the  symbol. The following modes are available:

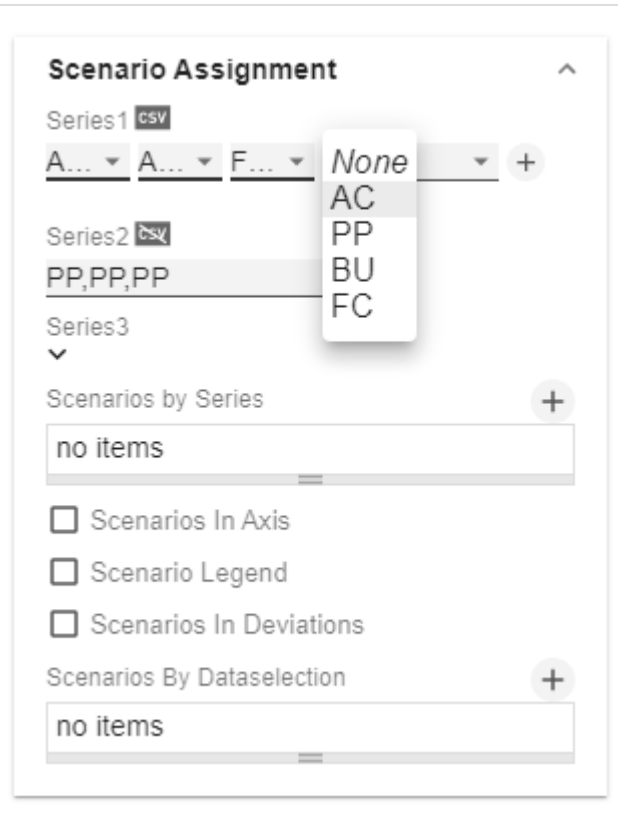
1. per field: The value is entered per field. After one field has been filled, another field is created automatically. For the Scenario Assignment (see picture) a list with all configured scenarios appears. By clicking on the scenario, the property for the element of the series is applied.
2. As a list: The entry is made as a comma-separated list.

Example: Application of the scenarios to elements of a series (see picture)



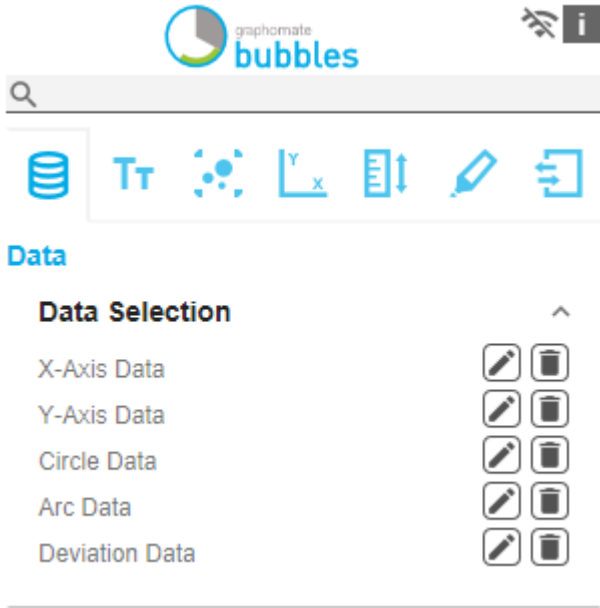
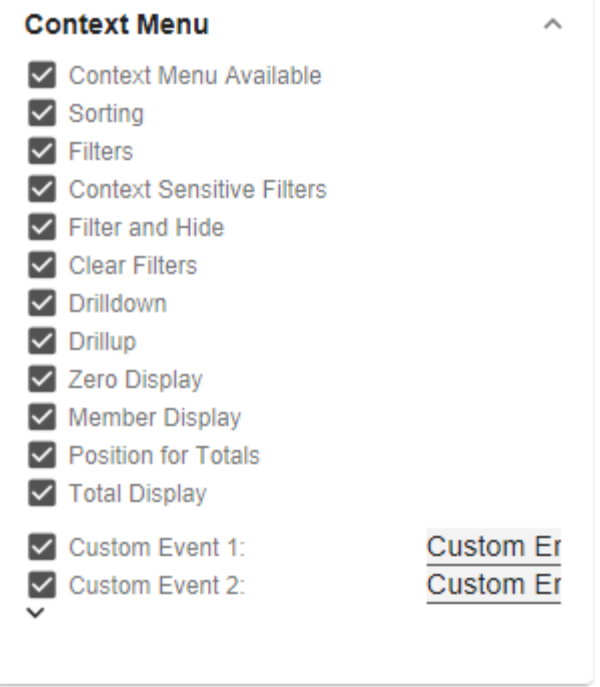
The first series contains two actual values (AC) and a forecast value (FC). The second series contains only values from the previous period (PP). You can enter the assignment of the scenarios as follows:

Variant per field for series 1: AC (field 1), AC (field 2), FC (field 3), AC (field 4, highlighted in the list)

Variant as list for series 2: PP,PP,PP,PP,



Data Tab

<p>Data Selection</p> <p>The Data Source which is to be used can be set via Drag&Drop onto the component or the entry <i>Data Binding</i> on the <i>Standard Properties Sheet</i>.</p> <p>Each of the data series <i>X Axis</i>, <i>Y Axis</i>,... sets a selection for each data dimension. You can click on the  button and select either a row or a column in the popup window. Remove a data selection by clicking on the corresponding  button.</p>	
<p>Context Menu</p> <p>In this section you will be able to choose which options are available in the context menu. An activated checkbox means this options will be shown. The first checkbox enables or disables the context menu altogether. Once activated the context menu will be accessible during runtime by right clicking on the component. The active operations will be usable as follows.</p> <p><i>Context Menu</i></p> <p>With the topmost checkbox, the entire context menu can be activated initially. An active context menu can be opened at runtime by right-clicking on the component and the activated ones of the following actions can be executed.</p> <p><i>Sorting</i></p> <p>With <i>Sorting</i> data from the available dimensions can be sorted in ascending or descending order.</p> <p><i>Filters</i></p> <p>Allows you to filter the data by member for all available dimensions.</p> <p><i>Context Sensitive Filters</i></p>	

Shows filters corresponding to the currently clicked dimension.

Filter and Hide

In addition to the normal filtering this operation also removes the corresponding dimension from our initial view.

Clear Filters

Resets previously set filters.

Drilldown

Adds another dimension to the component.

Drillup

Removes a dimension from the diagram (this can cause an error which makes a reload necessary).

Zero Display

Sets the way zero values are displayed.

Member Display

Lets you choose the way member names are displayed (text or key).

Position For Totals

Sets the positions for each total value per dimension to be displayed before or after other values.

Total Display

Enable or disable totals for each dimension.

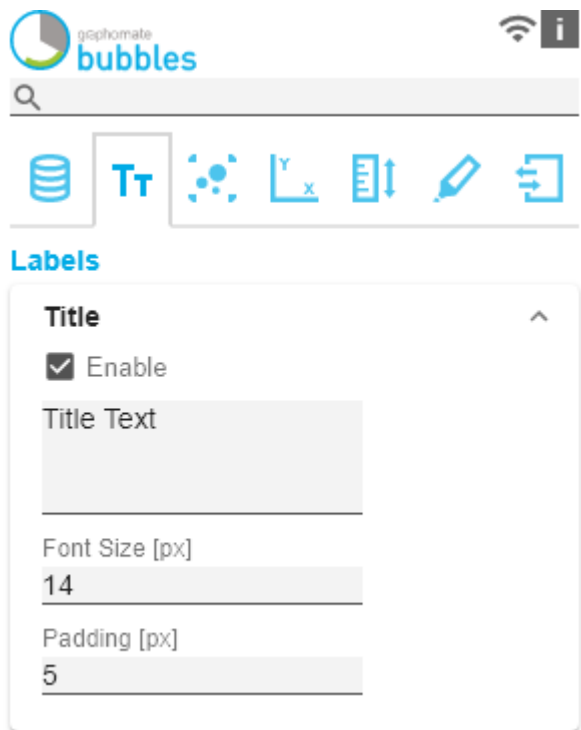
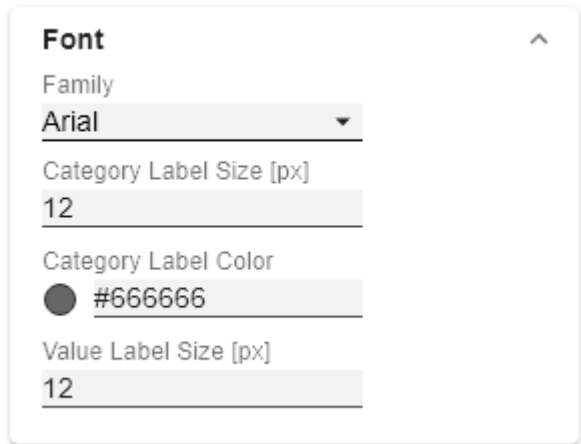
Custom Events

There are 10 possible events which can be linked to your own scripts. These can be defined in the *Standard Properties Sheet* and triggered using the corresponding button in the context menu.

In the *graphomate property sheet* the names for these buttons is customizable.

All operations are executed directly on the data source, but without changing it. A reload resets all changes made with the context menu.

Labels Tab

<p>Value Format</p>	

With the Value Format you define the way the values are displayed in the bubble chart.

Value Format basic

Set the format for absolute and percental values according to the numeral.js rules – see [Number Formatting](#). *Locale* can be changed here. If set to *AUTO* the locale of the data source is used.

Value Format extended

If you need a fixed format for the data labels you can set it here for all values. Choosing the parenthesis „(“ as the Negative Sign leads to negative numbers being shown inside parenthesis: (1234). The parameter in the Scaling field will be used as a divisor to scale the data labels.

Value Format universal

You access the configuration by clicking on an element in the list. You can create and define additional formats using the + symbol.

- **Locale:** Defines abbreviations, decimal and thousand separators for the respective language. You can choose between *en*, *de*, *fr* and *auto*.
- **Format Type:** Defines the type of number output. You can choose between *number* (decimal number), *percent* (percentage), *ordinal* (ordinal number) and *Time* (time unit).
- **Abbreviations:** Defines the type of abbreviations for all numbers to be formatted. You can choose between *mean* (abbreviation of the mean value), *min* (abbreviation of the minimum value), *max* (abbreviation of the maximum value), *auto* (best-suited abbreviation for the respective number), *trillion* (trillion abbreviation), *billion* (billion abbreviation), *million*, *thousand* and *none* (no abbreviation at all).
- **Negative Sign:** Defines how negative numbers are displayed. You can choose between *minus*, *parenthesis*, and *none* (no sign).
- **Prefix:** The input value is placed before the number.
- **Suffix:** The input value is placed after the number.
- **Thousands Separator:** Replaces the thousand separator set by the selected *locale*.
- **Decimal Separator:** Replaces the decimal separator set by the selected *locale*.
- **Total Digits:** Defines how many digits the number may consist of. *Total Digits* is prioritized over *Decimal Digits*.
- **Decimal Digits:** Defines how many decimal places of the formatted number are displayed.
- **Scaling Factor:** The value of each data point is multiplied by the entered number to scale values.
- **Zero Format:** When the checkbox is activated, any data value equal to 0 (the number zero) is replaced by the entered value.
- **Null Format:** Any data value that equals *NULL* (no value) is replaced by the entered value.
- **Error Format:** If a data value is undefined or the result of an arithmetic error such as dividing by 0 (zero), the data value is replaced by the entered value.
- **Rounding Method:** Defines the rounding method. You can choose between *half up* (23.5 24, -23.5 -23), *commercial* (23.5 24, -23.5 -24) and *trim* (23.5 23, -23.5 23).
- **Explicit Positive Sign:** Defines whether a positive number should always be preceded by a + (plus sign).
- **Time Units:** If *Time* has been specified for the format type, the time units can be set here. The default setting interprets data values as seconds and displays them as hours and minutes with decimal places in the format *h:mm.m*
- **Description:** Defines a description for the set configuration.

i Multiple Value Format Rules (Assignments) are prioritized in descending order, i.e. definitions that are lower in the list overwrite those above them when there filters overlap. Therefore, the generally valid format of the bubbles labels should be defined at the top of this list without any further filters. Value Formats defined below, restricted by filters, overwrite the formatting defined above - "From General to Special".

Time Unit Pop Up

For the Format Type *Time*, a system of units can be configured with the help of the Time Units Property, which in the default setting consists of hours and minutes. Each number formatted in this way is then splitted in its values for each unit. The order of the unit list defines their relationship from the largest unit (top) to the smallest unit (bottom). Each unit contains the following options:

- *Modulus*: defines the arithmetic relationship between the units. In terms of modular arithmetic, the number reflects how many entities of the next smaller unit fit into an entity of the current unit. If the current unit is the smallest of the unit system, the modulus establishes the reference to the raw value to be formatted. Thus, in the case of a unit system of hours and minutes with raw values that are given in minutes, the hours unit carries the modulus 60 and the minutes unit carries the modulus 1.
- *Prefix*: Defines the local prefix with which the value of this unit should begin. It can be used as a separator to values of larger units.
- *Suffix*: Defines the local suffix that should follow the value of this unit. For example, it can contain a unit abbreviation or be used as a separator to values of smaller units.
- *Omit If Zero*: Sets whether values of this unit should be omitted if they equal 0.
- *Leading Zeros*: Sets whether values of this unit should be displayed with one or more leading zeros (depending on the reference to the next larger unit).
- *Description*: Sets a description for the unit to make it easier to recognize in the list.

Manual Series Labels

At this point, strings can be assigned for the data series. The checkboxes activate the manually set label, otherwise the automatically generated labels are used.

The *Manual Series Labels* are also used for the legend.

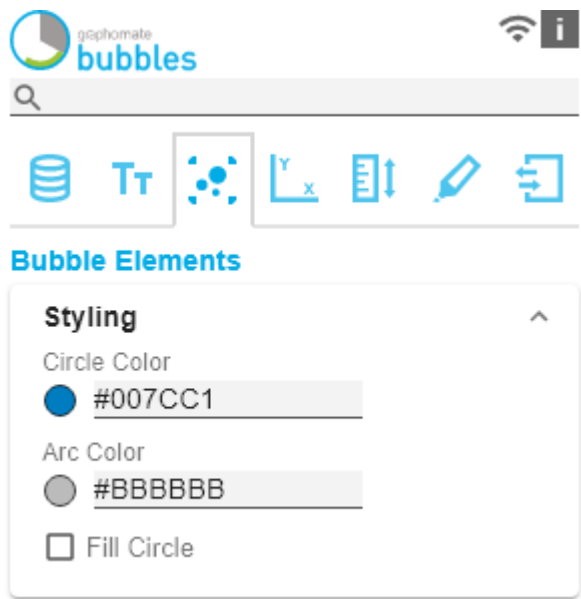
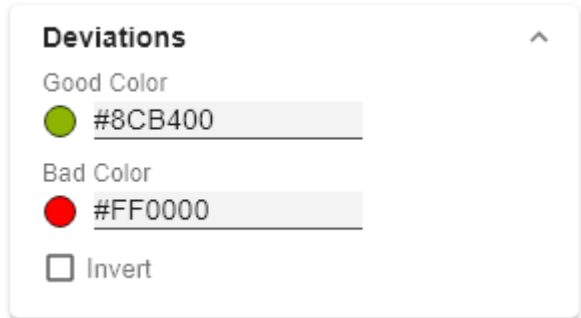

- *Operator*: Defines the condition for comparing the value with the operand(s).
 - *equal*: Is the value equal to the operand?
 - *not equal*: Is the value not equal to the operand?
 - *less*: Is the value smaller than the operand?
 - *less or equal*: Is the value smaller or equal to the operand?
 - *greater*: Is the value greater than the operand?

 - *always*: The effect is always applied regardless of the data.
 - *contains*: Does the value contain the operand? (for *Labels*)
- *Source*: Determines with which data series the operand or operands are compared.
 - *x*: The data value from which the position of the bubble on the X-axis results.
 - *y*: The data value from which the position of the bubble on the Y-axis results.
 - *circle*: The data value from which the area of the bubble results.
 - *arc*: The data value from which the area of the circular arc of the bubble results.
 - *dev*: The data value from which the deviation circle section of the bubble results.
 - *label*: The caption shown below the bubbles.
- *Value*: Determines with which values are going to be compared to the values from the data series.
 - *Value 1*: Not required for *Operator always*.
 - *Value 2*: Not required for operator always, contains, \geq , $>$, \leq , $<$, \neq and $=$
- *Effect*: Is applied if the condition is evaluated positively.
 - *circle color*: Changes the fill color of the circle.
 - *stroke color*: Changes the color of the circle border.
 - *stroke width*: Changes the thickness of the circle border.
 - *css class*: Adds the specified CSS class.
- *Characteristics*: Depending on which effect was defined, the following values can be stored
 - *circle color*: HEX code of a color.
 - *stroke color*: HEX code of a color.
 - *stroke width*: An integer that represents the line width in [px].
 - *css class*: Here you define the CSS class to be used.

Troubleshooting*Performance Limit*

Sets the limit for the maximum number of bubbles up to which no performance problems occur. Using values greater than 100 is not recommended. If the limit is reached, a performance-optimized display is used for the bubbles. Only the X and Y dimensions are used here. The individual data points are displayed transparently, so that accumulations of data points appear darker and therefore focal points can be recognized. To identify outliers, a tooltip is displayed when moving the mouse over a bubble.

Draw Boundaries

This option is intended for test purposes. If it is activated, its limits are drawn for each element. These boundaries are used by the collision logic to hide overlapping labels.

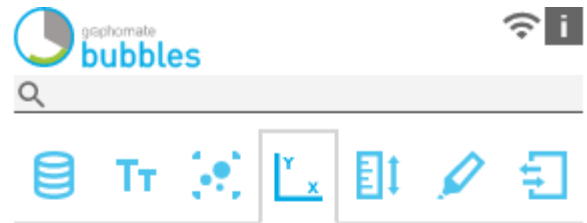

You can use the *Start of X/Y Axis* option to have the scaling of the axis start at 0 or any other arbitrary value. Similarly, you can use the *End of X/Y Axis* option for the corresponding axis to let the scaling of the axis end at any value.

Guides

To highlight threshold or target values, the so-called *Guides* can be added, whose appearance can be extensively customized.

Guides Pop-Up

With the + button *Guides* definitions can be added. The following options are available for each guide:

- *Description*: Enter the name of the guide here.
- *Value*: Defines the position of the guideline on the axis. If the character string *mean* is entered instead of a numerical value, the average of the data series on which the axis is based is taken as the value.
- *Color*: Opens the Color Picker to select a color for the line or defines the color using HEX code.
- *Width [px]*: Sets the width of the guideline in [px].
- *Label*: Are displayed on the axis at the position of the guideline. If *auto* is defined for the label, the line is provided with a label corresponding to the axis value at the position. If *none* is defined for the label, no label is displayed. Any other inserted text is displayed as label.

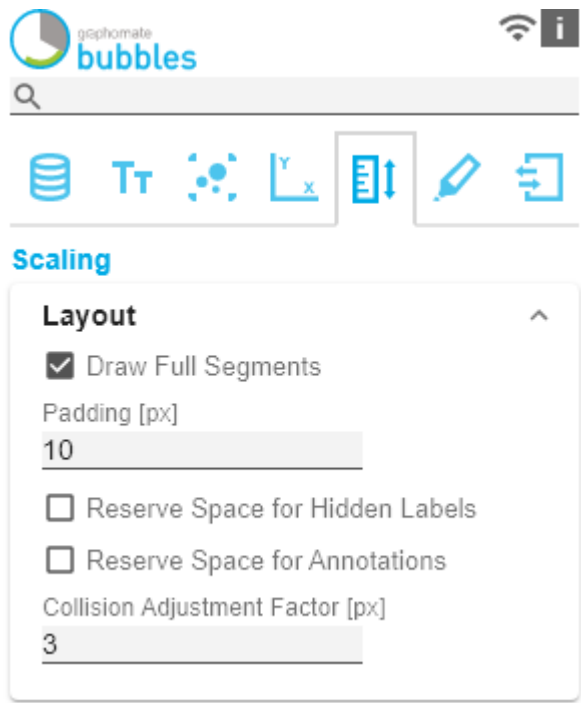
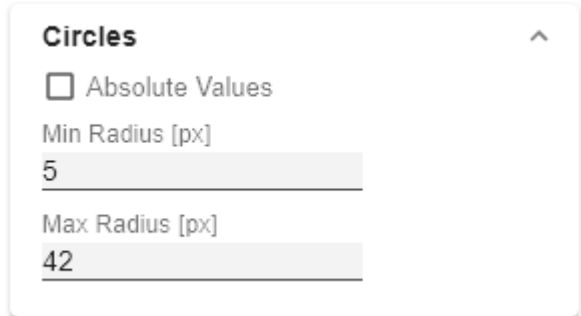

With this option, certain bubbles can be highlighted directly without moving the mouse over them.

Category Emphasis

A bubble is selected based on a portion of the contents of the category label. Several selectors are possible simultaneously. The entry is made per field or as comma-separated notation.

For example, if the cardinal point is part of the category label and all bubbles from west and north are to be highlighted, the value of the property would be as follows: North,West

Fade Out Opacity

This value determines to what extent bubbles that are not highlighted should be hidden. The value starts at 0.0 (completely hidden) and ranges up to 1.0 (completely visible).

Annotations

If this option is activated, *Annotations* are displayed at runtime when the mouse is moved over a bubble. Annotations are temporary labels that are connected to the bubble by lines and represent the respective value on the axis.

If this feature is enabled, bubbles are connected in the order in which they appear in the data. This can be used, for example, to display temporal progressions or to mark the assignment of bubbles to each other more clearly. How bubbles are assigned to each other is defined by the *Matcher Index*. Redundant elements in the *Category Label* are hidden if possible and only displayed at the first element.

On Hover

Determines whether the bubbles should be connected initially, or (if this option is activated) as soon as a bubble is highlighted with the mouse.

Matcher Index

This index defines how bubbles should be assigned to each other. The value -1 means that all bubbles are connected to each other. All values from 0 to n define the position of the category label of the element to be assigned. Ranges

Ranges can be added to highlight complete areas of the X or Y dimensions. This is done by clicking on the +-symbol. Alternatively, one of the existing sample definitions can be activated and adjusted. The Ranges are divided into areas that should be marked on the X- or Y-dimensions. The checkbox in front of the definitions activates the respective range. Furthermore the following options are available:

- **Enable:** (De)Activates the Range.
- **Description:** Descriptions can be inserted here.

Trend

The checkbox activates the trend line. It is intended to visualize the trend of the development of the displayed data points and to make connections recognizable. This line is the regression line known from statistics, which represents the linear relationship of values in a Cartesian coordinate system. The following options are available:

- **Color:** Determines which color the trend line should have.
- **Width [px]:** Defines the width of the trend line.
- **Correlation:** Activates the display of the correlation coefficient under the legend of the bubbles. This indicates how precisely the course of the trend line can be determined. The value varies between 1 (absolutely accurate trend line) and 0 (trend line not meaningful).

For orientation in the coordinate system, various graphs can be added according to their function and then drawn. This is done by clicking on the + button. Alternatively one of the existing sample definitions can be activated and adapted. The checkbox in front of the definitions activates the respective graph. - *Enable:* (De)Activates the graph.
- *Description:* Descriptions can be inserted here.
- *Function:* The function that determines the appearance of the graph. They can be written following the specifications of expr-eval and depend on the variable x . For example x , x^2 , $\sin(x)$, \sqrt{x} , $\log(x)$.

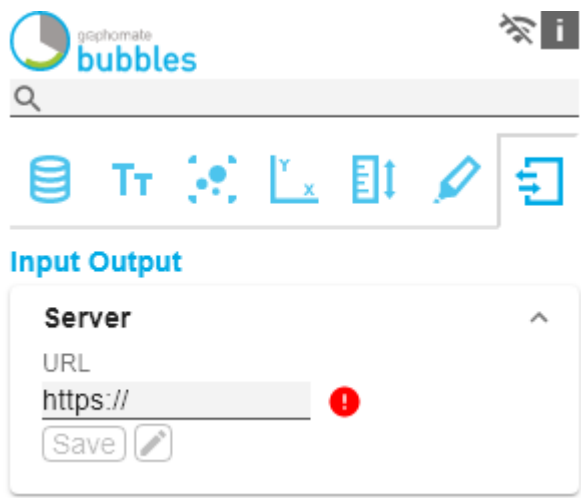
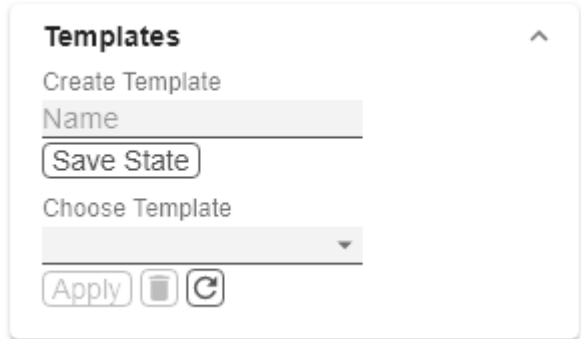

Input Output Tab

The functions of this tab are used to exchange templates for the graphomate bubbles. Connect to the graphomate server - a free component of graphomate GmbH - to store or load a graphomate bubbles template. This way you can exchange preconfigured graphomate bubbles designs between BI frontends that support the graphomate server. These are currently Power BI, Tableau, SAP Analytics Cloud, SAP Lumira Designer and SAP Web Intelligence.

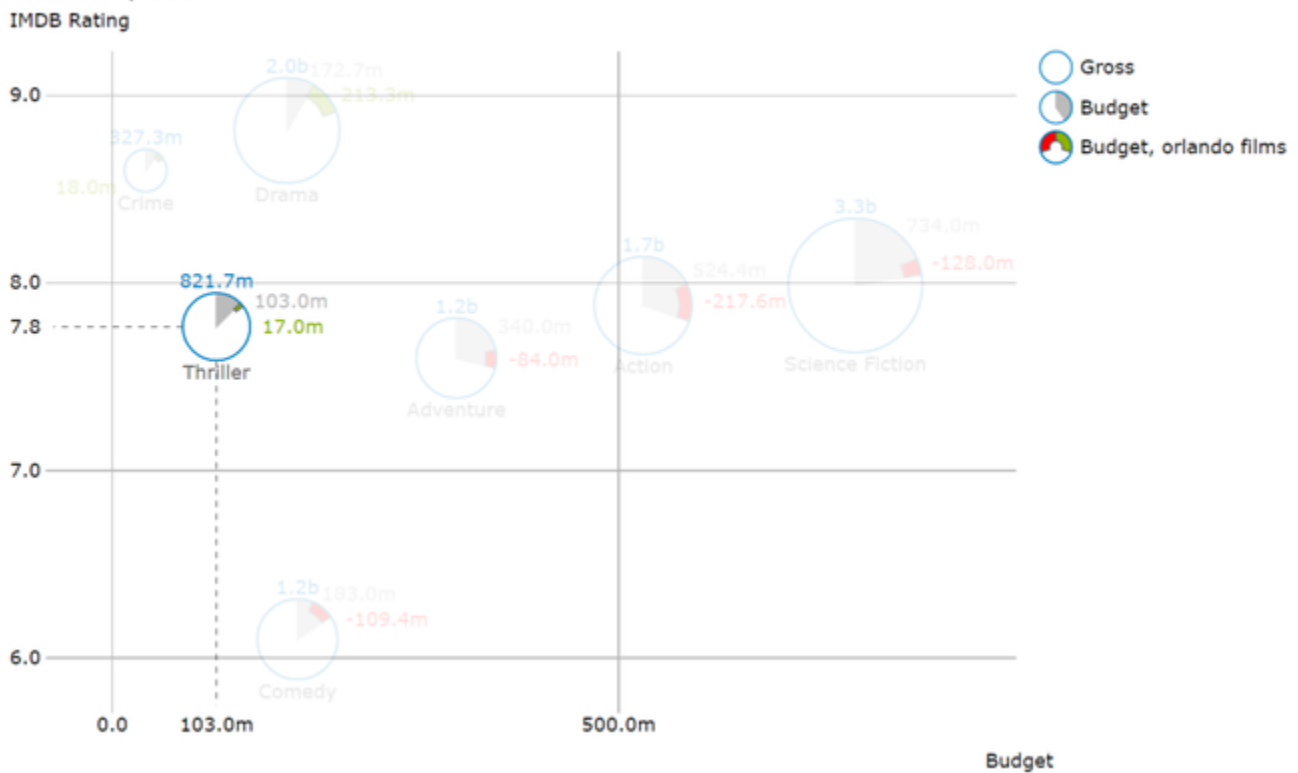

The *graphomate bubbles* provide the functionality to selectively show all the information associated with a single *Bubble*. To highlight a data point use your mouse to hover over a single *Bubble*. Now all the values, labels and annotations will be displayed. This state can be fixed with **CTRL+Click**. If the *Connection - Related Bubbles* and *Connection - Bubbles On Hover* options are activated, all associated bubbles will also be highlighted and the connection will be displayed sequentially.

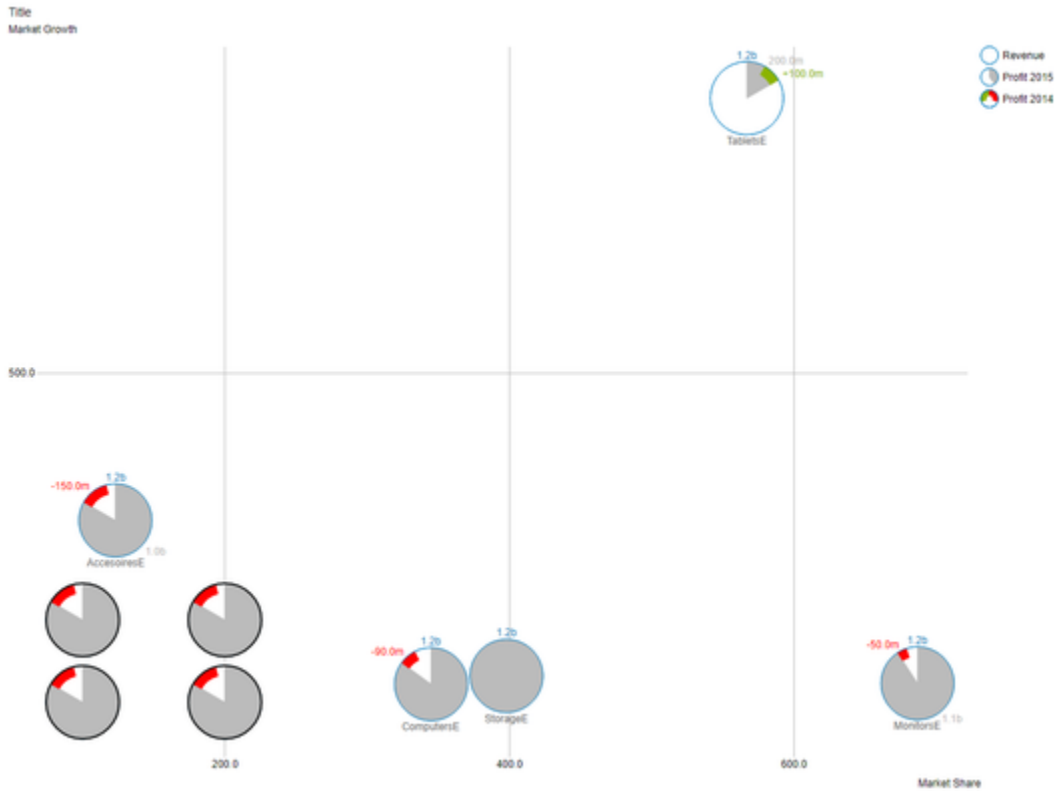

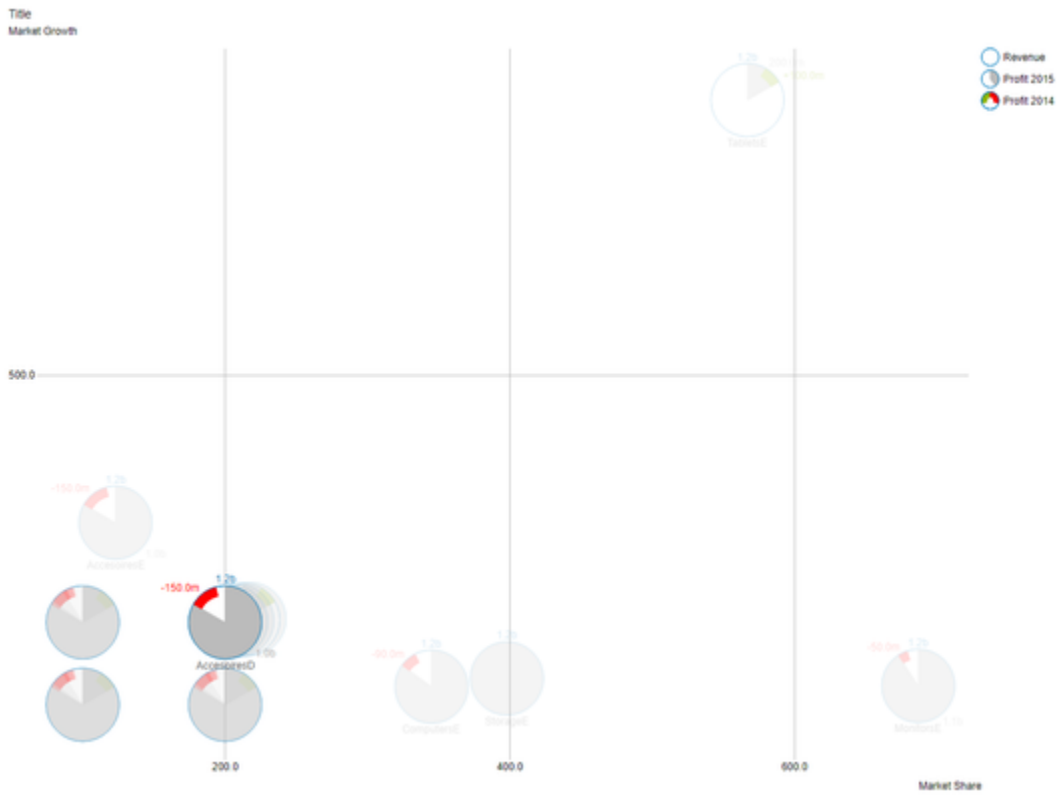

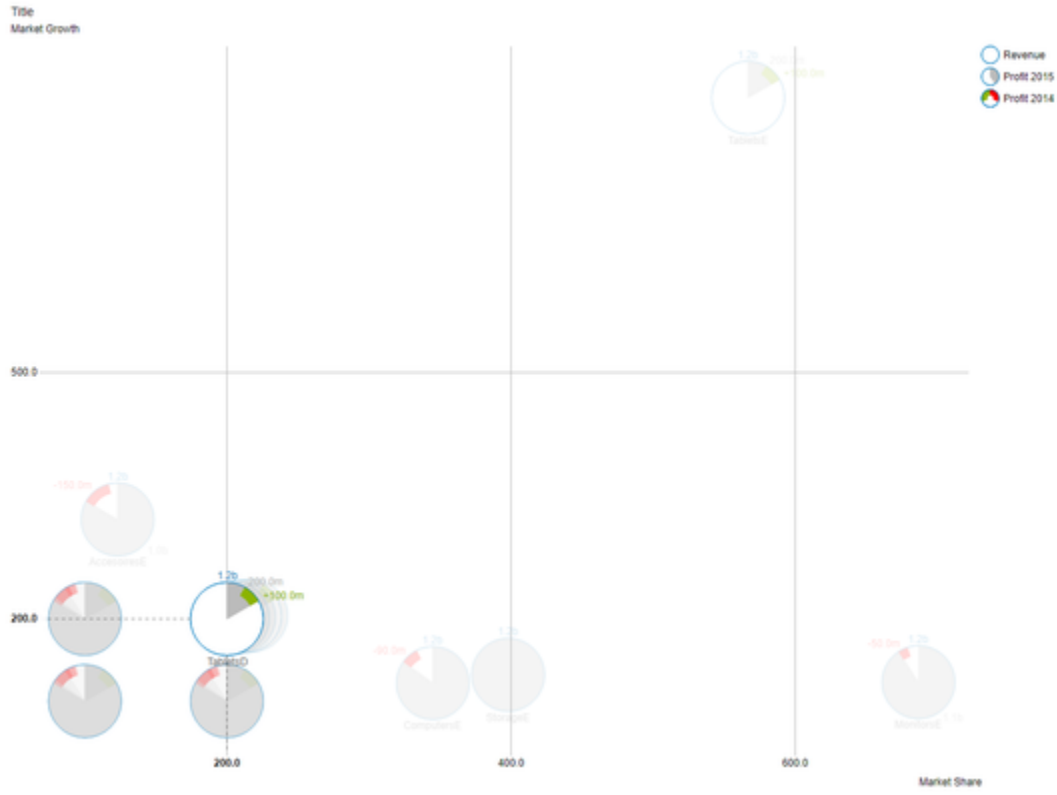
Depending on the data set, Bubbles can be drawn with the same X and Y position and the same radius. The accumulations of bubbles are then characterized by the fact that they lack any labeling and the border is drawn thicker.



If the mouse is hovered over such a **Cluster** of bubbles, the underlying bubbles fan out aside. The front bubble is displayed completely including their labels.



If one of the fanned bubbles is now hovered, this one is brought to the foreground and displayed in the correct (original) position with its labels.

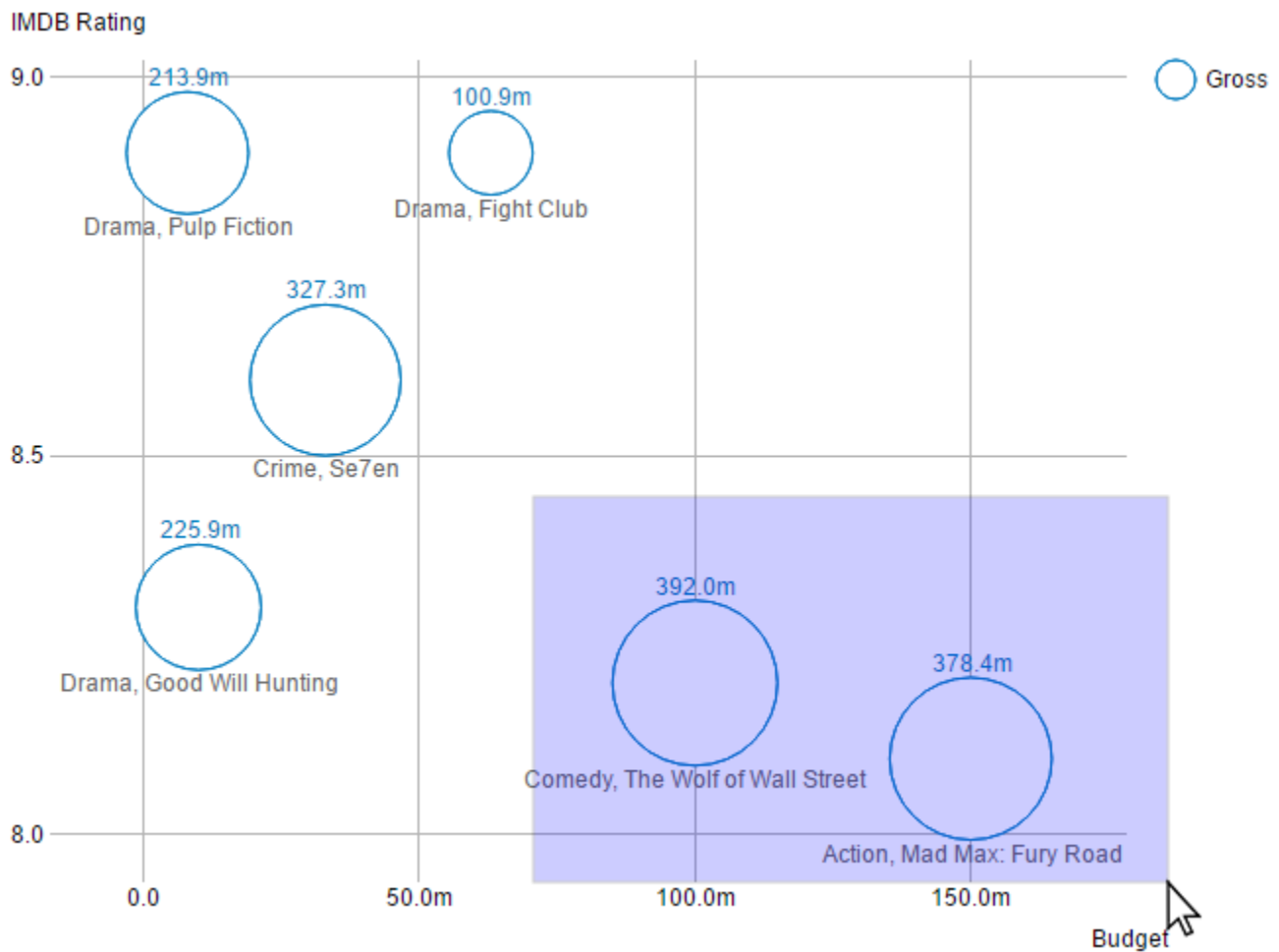
The following four zoom modes Rectangular Selection, Rectangular Section, Magnification and Scaling Adjustment can be set in the graphomate property sheet in the tab *Scaling* under **Zoom**.

The selection **None** and **Selection** both activate the rectangular selection, whereby **Selection** only displays the previously selected sections on the axes, **Magnify** the magnification and **Scale** the scaling adjustment.

Scale Adjustment

This mode is similar in operation to the **Magnification** mode, i.e. using the mouse wheel (scrolling) and Drag&Drop. The scaling of the axes is then adjusted so that only a section of the bubbles is displayed. This section is determined by the position of the mouse pointer.



The displayed section can be moved by drag & drop.



i For technical reasons, this mode is more complex and thus consumes more resources while expanding. As a result, too many bubbles lead to a delay in drawing. Internet Explorer also leads to a noticeable slowdown.

Small Multiples Mode

To draw a Scatter- or Bubble-Diagram Data for the X- and the Y-Axis is necessary to be set in correlation. If one or both of these Measures is missing, an alternative mode will be used to draw the Bubbles. The so called *Small Multiples Mode*.



In this mode all data points will be drawn sorted by the *Circle-Measure* from high to low in small tiles. If there are too many data points to be drawn, the smaller ones will be summarized in the *Rest* tile.

Some options and features that are usable in the normal mode are deactivated while the Bubbles are in *Small Multiples Mode*.

Percentages and numbers are formatted separately. For this two format string are used, which follow the same rules and structure. In general the strings of characters in the format string are simply replaced in the input number. Exceptions to this rule would be scaling factors and the number of decimal places.

The separate elements of the format string are separated by the "|" character. Format strings with less than 7 elements (i.e. 6 "|" characters) are considered invalid and therefore ignored. In this case the standard format without scaling and with one position after the decimal point is used.

The format string consists of the following elements, the ordering is obligatory and cannot be changed:
Negative|Prefix|Thousands|Decimal|Scaling|PointsAfterDecimal|Suffix

Negative	The prefix for negative numbers. The string "(" will result in the number will be placed inside parentheses, including eventual prefixes and suffixes. If <i>None</i> is used the absolute number will be shown.
Prefix	A prefixed string of characters, for example a currency symbol or an identifier for the scaling factor.
Thousands	A separator for thousands.
Decimal	A separator for the decimal places.
Scaling	The scaling factor for the value. This can be given as a whole number or a power, formatted as n^m . A whole number will be calculated as a power to the basis 10 internally. In case of a given power the value will be divided by it directly. Even negative numbers are possible, for example "-3" or "10^-3"; in this case the value will get adequately higher. Non numeric inputs are ignored. <i>Please note:</i> given a "0" or a "1" will result in a scaling factor of 1. The only way to achieve a scaling by 10 is to input "10^1".
